





Sudan Law Reform Update

October 2009

Welcome to the second issue of the Sudan law reform update. The Project for Criminal Law Reform in Sudan (PCLRS), a joint initiative of SORD and REDRESS, provide this regular service with a view to informing those working on, and interested in, law reform and human rights of relevant developments. The update includes a summary of the news (largely based on English language media sources) on law reform, jurisprudence and other developments. It also aims to serve as a platform for sharing of information, comments and opinions on any issues related to law reform and human rights in Sudan.

This issue covers developments in October 2009 up to 26 October 2009. It features further news concerning discussions on the National Security Bill and focuses on the advancement of the draft referendum bill. It also contains the text of the African Union High Level Panel on Darfur as published in the press (it has not been made public officially), which examines the capacity of the existing legal framework in Sudan to investigate and prosecute international crimes.

She has vowed to continue her case against the Speaker.
